MAY 11, 2009

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BUDGET

The budget is finished and what a road they took to get to the finish line. The legislature has allocated nearly 80% of the federal stimulus and stabilization money; and have alleviated the need to go to a special session most likely. The big question which remains is whether or not the legislature will expand Medicaid eligibility for adults. Here is a brief overview on how the money was spent;

\$2.197 billion in Federal Budget Stabilization (FBS) -

* HBs 1-13 spent \$783.3 million in FBS; Operating Budget

* HB 15 spends \$8.5 million in FBS; Capital expenditures

* HB 21 spends \$57.5 million in FBS; Capital expenditures, grants on child care, energy efficiency and other earmarked categories by the federal government and

* HB 22 spends \$381.3 million in FBS; Capital and economic development programs.

This leaves \$966.8 million FBS unspent for FY 2010. He predicted needing \$711.3

million to "hold harmless" the FY 2011 budget. He predicts that this will leave a

\$255.5 million FBS balance. There is also a \$150 million GR balance unspent for FY

2010.

\$2.2 billion of stimulus money is spent in HBs 15 and 21, which consist of capital expenditures and economic development recruitment for large businesses to locate in Missouri.

#4-SB 711 FIX (SB174) THIS IS NOW PART OF HB148

Modifies provisions of law relating to property taxation.

Bill History:

The Property tax fix as it relates to FPD's was amended onto the latest omnibus tax bill, as well as the local government bill. The local government bill should clear the conference committee this week. The property tax bill, onto which this item is amended, is out of conference and should be voted on by mid.

Jorgen believes this bill has a good opportunity to get passed. The fix they placed in the bill was the 1984 hold harmless date. In addition it requires posting of your rate three times per year, and the assessor to also state the taxing jurisdictions rate.

The Property tax fix as it relates to FPD's was amended onto the latest omnibus local government bill. I believe this bill has a good opportunity to get passed. The fix they placed in the bill was the 1984 hold harmless date. The senate also placed on the bill the requirement to revote your levy every 5 years and roll your levy back except for new

construction. We have worked out a deal on this item as well to remove that second provision but will have to post the levy three times a year.

BILLS OF INTEREST TO US (FOR AND AGAINST)

CONSORTIUM BILL

FEDERAL REIMBURSEMENT ALLOCATION

[HB 459](#) [Schaaf](#) Creates a federal reimbursement allowance for ground ambulance services. This is the bill that will allow more federal dollars to be used for reimbursements to ambulance emergency services reimbursements.

Bill History: **This bill has been dropped in favor of SB307 below**

This bill is in conference and should pass this year.

[SB 307](#) [Dempsey](#) Imposes a gross receipts tax on certain ambulance service providers. This is the companion to HB459.

Bill History: **This bill has passed and is now on the governors desk.**

This bill is in conference and should pass this year.

HAZARDOUS MATERIAL SPILL LEGISLATION

WE ARE OPPOSING THIS BILL.

[SB 462](#) - [Crowell](#) - **No further action. Essentially dead.**

No further action on this bill occurred this week. The proponents have sent us language attempting to negotiate this item, but it is too broad as it basically disallows any reimbursement be billed if any of the resources are publicly funded.

Modifies provisions pertaining to hazardous substance spills and emergencies. Under current law, when more than 50 gallons of petroleum, natural gas, natural gas liquids, liquified natural gas, or synthetic gas are spilled or released, it is considered a hazardous substance emergency. This act changes the minimum threshold to 3,000 gallons.

[SB 7](#) [Griesheimer](#) Requires communities to file one copy of any technical code adopted with the clerk's office to be available to the public, rather than three copies. **This bill is now the Omnibus Local Government Bill**

The sales tax provision was removed from all the local government bills as it had too much opposition to clear the Senate. All appropriate items that should pass have been to our Mutual Aid bill HB103.

OTHER BILLS WE ARE ASSISTING IN

HB 103 –MUTUAL AID

Bill History:

This bill has passed and is on the Governors desk.

This bill has passed the Senate and is waiting for the House to concur with the changes. First the sprinkler in residential dwellings issue was attached per our agreement with the Homebuilders Association, which disallows local political subdivisions from adopting the portion of the code relating to residential sprinklers prior to Dec 31, 2011. In exchange the homebuilders agree that they will not seek an extension to the date or any other local restrictions regarding residential sprinkler ordinances other than what they can get each local political subdivision to agree to when adopting the code locally. The second item included is a provision establishing criteria for elevator inspectors. The bill also allows broader use of defibrillators. We hope to have the bill finished by mid week.

INCREASE STATUTE OF LIMITATION ON ARSON

This provision will be included in two more bills this week and Jorgen is hopeful that one of the two will be passed if the sponsor can keep other controversial crime amendments off the bill. Jorgen talked to the House Chairman of Criminal Law and he will include it in one of the Omnibus bills.

OTHER BILLS

The following is a list of bills that may affect the fire service in some way. There are several that we will be actively opposing.

SB 122 **Griesheimer** Allows members of an ambulance district board of directors to be subject to recall from office.

Bill History: **This bill has also been incorporated into the new local government bill hb376**

Election Laws

HB 173 **Cox, Stanley**

We are opposed to this bill.
Not on calendar-effectively dead now.
NO MOVEMENT

This bill was voted out but not before it was wounded by amendments. This bill has not been reported in yet, therefore not close to being eligible for floor debate.

HB 316

Jones-89

Changes the laws regarding the Open Meetings and Records Law, commonly known as the Sunshine Law.

Bill History: This bill was heard and passed out of the Senate General Laws committee, but not before major changes were made that essentially makes the opponents now the proponents and vice versa. The bill was not reported in and therefore is not on the debate calendar so probably dead.

This bill will be heard in the Senate General Laws committee where Jorgen does not expect it to move forward, but he did not predict it would make it to the Senate either. With only two weeks remaining and the bill has not yet been heard, it has a difficult road to passage.
NO MOVEMENT

SB 494

Griesheimer

Allows certain counties to seek voter approval for a sales tax to fund interoperable emergency communications – Introduced. This bill applies to St. Louis County.

Under current law, any county which has established an emergency communications system commission may, upon voter approval, levy and collect a property tax to fund the establishment, operation, and maintenance of an emergency communications system. This act would give such counties the option to seek voter approval to impose the property tax or a sales tax not to exceed one-tenth of one percent to fund the establishment, operation, and maintenance of an emergency communications system. The Department of Revenue will collect the sales tax revenues and deposit them into the newly created county emergency communications fund for distribution to the counties from which they were collected

Bill History: This provision was included in the local government bill, which is in Conference and should pass this week.

This provision was included in the local government bill, which should clear the Senate this week and move to conference. I am hopeful this provision will be passed this year.

HB 1145 Roorda, Jeff –

NO MOVEMENT

Not on calendar-effectively dead now.

Changes provisions relating to ambulance and fire protection district taxes. The bill states;

99.848. Notwithstanding subsection 1 of section 99.847, any district providing emergency services pursuant to chapter 190 or 321, RSMo, shall be entitled to reimbursement from the special allocation fund in the amount of at least fifty percent nor more than one hundred percent of the district's tax increment, and the ambulance district board or fire protection district board shall set the refund amount rate before the assessment is paid into the special allocation fund. This section shall not apply to tax increment financing projects or districts approved prior to August 28, 2004.
